Baptismal Instruction on Sept. 9; Be sure to sign up by August 25

Wednesday, September 9, will be Emmanuel's next baptismal preparation session. There won't be another session until December 15, so if you'd like your child baptized before then, be sure to register for the September class. If you would like to attend, *please contact Susie Feldmann in the parish office by August 25 to enroll* (961-2393). There is no cost to attend.

At least one parent must attend an evening session before their child can be baptized at Emmanuel. Grandparents are also invited, and Godparents are strongly encouraged to attend. You do not have to set a baptismal date to come to a session. If you are pregnant or still deciding about baptizing your child here, please come to one of these sessions. They are a wonderful opportunity to learn more about baptism and to explore raising your child as a Christian, as well as a chance to get to know other parents in the parish.

The preparation sessions begin with dinner at 6:00 p.m. Childcare will be available. Sessions run about 2½ hours. You need not attend the session closest to your child's baptismal date, just choose one that works



with your schedule and is prior to the day you want to have your child baptized. Fall baptismal dates are: September 20 at 9:00 a.m., September 27 at 10:30, November 1 at 10:30, November 8 at 9:00, and December 27 at 10:00 a.m.

Weekday Parking at Emmanuel

With the beginning of another school year, parking during the week in the vicinity of the church will be at a premium because we are surrounded by three campuses: Webster University, Nerinx Hall H.S. and Eden Seminary. (Our Building Manager Lamon Brown is kept busy guarding our lot from encroachment by Webster University students.) Emmanuel shares the north half of our parking lot with Nerinx Hall to help ease this situation, and Nerinx reciprocates by contributing to the cost of maintenance and snow removal, which some years is substantial. On Tuesday, August 18, school resumes for our Nerinx Hall neighbors, and students will once again park on the north half of our lot. When visiting Emmanuel on weekdays, please remember to use the south half (Big Bend side) of our lot or, if you have a permit, use the handicap spaces along the west curb of Bompart Avenue.

In the past, members of the parish who attended a matinee at the Repertory Theatre or are on the faculty and staff of Webster University have used the church lot during the week. That has rarely posed a problem. However, during the next 5 months while we are under construction there will be less space available on our lot due to the construction crew's vehicles and equipment. Therefore, we must ask that **unless you are here for church business, please do not use the church lot on weekdays.** In order to free up more than a dozen spaces, parish and Nursery School staff will park at Eden Seminary, which has graciously given us temporary permits to park at their facility. (Thank you, Al Schon, Director of Administration at Eden Seminary!)

(It's still up, so you didn't miss it – hurry over and read it in its entirety!). But, for now, I want to mention three unexpected forms of ministry that we experienced this year.

A day or two before leaving, Carol Greene presented us with a large bag full of her artisan Greenwood Bears – ranging in size from 3 to 12 inches tall. While we didn't know exactly how they would be used, we gladly accepted them and told her we would find them good homes. On our first work day, after saying our hellos and catching up on STOHFH (Sicangu Tikaga Okiciyapi Habitat For Humanity) news, we approached the Executive Director, Sandy, and asked that he give us some idea about what to do with a bag full of bears. Sandy just grinned and said, 'I'll get back to you.' Two days later, as we headed out to our building site, Sandy said, 'Oh, by the way, I talked to the tribal ambulance service and they told me they just ran out of teddy bears to give to kids they all too often have to pick up for emergency care.' The next day, Donna and a couple of other missioners drove to the Rosebud Emergency Medical Center and presented them with much needed comfort items- a whole bag full of bears! You can see a beautiful picture of the EMT staff person accepting the bears on our blog.

Another parishioner, and former AMT member, Peg Cooper, donated a box of good quality office paper, as well as a bag of knitted items from the Knitters Group. I delivered the office paper the first day we were at Bishop Hare. LaCosta, the STOHFH office manager was delighted to have such an abundance of good paper. She routinely has to print office memos and documents on coarse gray paper so this shipment of higher grade copy paper is a blessing for the HFH office budget. And the clergy couple on the reservation, Father John and Mother Judy Spruhan will be distributing the wonderful knit items to their parishioners throughout the fall and winter months.

A new form of ministry was also started by Andy Ruhlin who decided to donate an accumulation of hotel/ travel toiletries (items which most of us casually pick up when we're on the road) to the Domestic Violence Women's Shelter. Trying to locate the facility was an

adventure as we took a couple of back streets looking for the address. The shelter resembled a **fortress**, complete with floodlights, high fencing & security cameras on every corner! Andy hopped out of the van and disappeared to the front of the building with a yet another bag. Happily the women in the shelter are safe because of all the security, and Andy could not get past the first door! But once again, our seemingly minor offerings were graciously and gratefully accepted by a facility that has many needs and few resources.

These were the beginnings of ministries that we hope, and expect, we can expand upon in 2010. Maybe next year we can take a couple boxes of paper. Maybe the bear bag/donated 'cuddle' animals for children will be bigger. Maybe we'll have a box full of hotel toiletries to take with us to the shelter. Maybe these spontaneous and unplanned acts of generosity will blossom into even bigger and unexpected blessings for us – and for our brothers and sisters on the Rosebud Reservation.

It wouldn't surprise us at all - we expect the unexpected from Emmanuel and Christ Lutheran.

All profits go directly to outreach as MOE underwrites the minimal expenses (advertising, tables). The Salvation Army arrives at the end of the sale to take away all unsold remaining items and finds a home for those items.

Report on the Episcopal Church in the new Diocese of Kiteto, Tanzania

During 2008-2009 school year, Eden Seminary had its second Anglican priest from Tanzania as a student. In February Isaiah Chambala was elected the first bishop of the new Diocese of Kiteto. Since Bishop Smith was going to be at General Convention on the date of Isaiah's consecration, the bishop sent Dr. Katherine Mathews and me to represent himself and the diocese.

Both before and after the consecration, we visited a congregation in each of the eight deaneries. The Diocese of Kiteto has 140 congregations within 35 parishes. We were met with such gracious hospitality and experienced such a lively faith (expressed in very lively music by more than one choir in even the smallest congregations) that it was a bit overwhelming.

The consecration was a glorious occasion, although a bit long by our standards (seven hours!) It was followed by the first meeting of the Synod (their diocesan convention). During that gathering Dr. Mathews was elected to their Diocesan Council, and I was appointed as one of the six Canons of the diocese. There the Canons are the senior retired clergy who constitute the Bishop's Council of Advice.

Although the diocese consists of some of the poorest districts in the country, their ambitions are impressive. They are committed to establishing secondary (high) schools in as many villages as possible. They have opened an eye clinic and are committed to working on education for women, a serious issue in the country. One highlight was visiting Magungu, a small village, where a new school is being built with funds from an Emmanuel family. After two months they are up to nine students and the whole village is doing the manual labor involved. Four young men with junior college level training are teaching the nine in the small village church. They have no equipment, but yet are teaching all the subjects in English, no less! I am determined to help find a way to enable them to study subjects like biology and chemistry with appropriate equipment.

The whole diocese is evangelistic to the core, and it is growing rapidly. Most of the congregations are headed by laymen, called evangelists. They are doing all of this, while trying to improve the lives of their people through community development projects.

I have much more to tell you, and I hope very soon to offer a slide show and talk on the trip.
