She's certainly been a force in my prayer life.

Growing up with two vastly different spiritual cultures in my home, Latina and Celtic, I was blessed by both. My Celtic family loved Patrick and Brigid and often shared stories about them. You may also know that I wrote an icon of Brigid (pictured) in which I incorporated images of some of my favorite legends about her: the St. Brigid's cross, the sacred fire, her bishop's staff and chasuble, and a lake of lager (every drop a prayer, she is said to have prayed). Each has a meaning I'm happy to discuss, but not here. (Maybe a future Christian formation series on some of our favorite saints?)

The one legend that I couldn't incorporate as an image in this icon is the very characteristic she shares with our beloved parish: "givingness." This term is taken from one of my favorite poems about St. Brigid and you can read it <a href="here">here</a>. Brigid apparently exasperated her family with her generosity to the poor, taking their food and treasures and sharing them with those in need. All who witnessed it, however, saw the presence of God motivating her.

In our second year together, I have seen God powerfully and undeniably present in our community, especially through the

generosity that pours forth along many pathways here: our worship, ministries, friendships, and financial support. I have the privilege of witnessing the process by which decisions get made in various areas of our church life. I wish everyone could see the generosity that guides these decisions.

Your vestry has guided us so generously this past year, especially our Executive Committee: Allison Williams, Sr. Warden, Charlie Walch, Jr. Warden, Maryann Vognild, Treasurer, and Lynn Stephenson, Secretary. Please take another look at the Vestry Stewardship Covenant, which is your elected leadership's commitment to the church on how they are guided to make decisions about money. They have been icons of "givingness" for our community and I thank them sincerely.

I also thank the finance and foundation committees for their commitment to stewarding the financial resources God has given us, making recommendations to our vestry that will enable us to continue serving faithfully for generations to come.

Emmanuel has a superb staff, as you know. Their commitment to the relationships among us as well as the needs of each person in our parish and beyond, is a



blessing. Every decision, from what music and prayers to use in worship, to an awareness of the impact on creation of our use of paper for Sunday bulletins, to serving a person in need who walks in, is made with a generosity of spirit and balance of priorities. It's a beautiful thing to behold and I thank them for their extraordinary "givingness."

Our clergy are also "givingness" personified. Sujanna+ heard and readily answered God's call to her to serve through her many pastoral care ministries, especially Emmanuel Prays and the international student ministry called A Light to the Nations. Deacon Jerre has been a stalwart advocate of the poor, gives of his financial and organizational wisdom to our ministries, and provides prayers for our worship that deeply move and motivate us to serve. Warren+ is an endless source of wisdom and grace to us all, and Paul+ is a gentle presence of love and experience among us. I give thanks for our clergy.

Dear Emmanuel!

My journey at Emmanuel has been unfolding in many ways, adding new chapters every year. I thank Almighty God for the opportunity to serve, preach, learn, and adapt to the congregation's evolving needs. My role at Emmanuel has been multifaceted, encompassing Eucharist services, seasonal liturgies, Eucharist services at Bethesda, and supporting the pastoral care

team, which includes the Eucharistic Visitor ministry, prayer shawl ministry, and Martha's Meals ministry.

A recent addition to Emmanuel's existing ministries is Sunrise Senior Assisted Living. I conduct non-denominational services every alternate month for residents who are also members of our congregation.

With the help of Valori+ and Peg Cooper, I submitted a proposal that was approved at the convention. This grant of \$25,000.00 will be of great assistance in serving the inter-faith international student communi-

The Caring Ministries Committee of Emmanuel Episcopal Church, originally formed to oversee the needs of older adult parishioners, broadened its focus to include all members of the parish several years ago. Eucharist at Bethesda which began in 2022 under the direction of Rev. Sujanna Raj has continued on the first and third Thursdays of the month. Eucharist is celebrated with the residents of Bethesda at Old Orchard Retirement Community. There are quite a

few Emmanuel members who live there. Rev. Sujanna celebrates most of the time and Rev. Jerre Birdsong comes when she is not available. In 2023, 225 communions have been served with an average attendance of 5.9 residents and 5.3 facilitators (clergy + musicians + Caring Committee members) at each service. Having Susan Shillito provide music for the service each time is a delight as well as her cohort Bob Shillito.

Martha's Meals: Delivery of meals continues to provide meals for individuals and families during a difficult time under the leadership of Lisa Liss. In 2023, over 37 meals were taken by volunteers to individuals and families.

The card ministry: Parishioners aged 70 or older received a special birthday card from Emmanuel. Couples celebrating 50 years of marriage or more, as well as those couples celebrating their 25th anniversary, received a special anniversary card. Parishioners who lost a

loved one received a bereavement card. Thinking of You Cards were sent to individuals who were ill, had surgery, or were just in need of a cheerful greeting. All cards were designed by Committee members and signed by the chair of the committee for the clergy and the committee. Individuals who received a prayer shawl also received a card. A total of 204 cards were sent out in 2023 including 135 birthday cards, 19 fiftieth anniversary cards, 0 twenty-fifth anniversary cards, 24 bereavement cards and 26 thinking of you cards. This ministry at Emmanuel is primarily undertaken through Faith in Action. At the heart of Emmanuel is a commitment to serve, and our Faith in Action is evidence of that commitment. It is the largest ministry at Emmanuel and comprises many, many ways we serve our neighbors in Jesus' name. We have divided these many ministries into four Pillars: Feeding and Caring, Justice and Equity, EarthLove, and Diocesan Minis-

tries. A report for each of these Pillars follows. Kathleen Martin and Tom Smith serve as cochairs of Faith in Action.

Jesus is calling us to connect up our talents and passions with the needs of the world. What is Jesus calling you to do? We think you will find the answer in one of our four Pillars. If you want to address a need, but don't know how to do it, talk to your deacon. If you want to do something to help, but don't know what ministry to get involved in, talk to your deacon. And if you think that service



ministry is not for you, expect to be gently nudged by your deacon. That's what we do!

Emmanuel Food Ministry began in 1973 as an Emergency Food Center for St. Louis County. Today, we still operate a food center that is open Monday-Friday 9 am to 2 pm. In addition to the food center, we donate non-perishable food and funds for food to various organizations such as Webster-Rock Hill Ministries and Isaiah 58 Ministries. Our food center receives referrals from other churches, from Webster-Rock Hill Ministries, Webster University and others in our community.

#### EarthLove Team Hits the Ground Running: Sustainability, Gardens & Bees, Oh my!

EarthLove, a Faith-in-Action pillar, began organizing and meeting in mid-2023. We have begun with a dynamic and talented team that is always ready to share their ideas and happy to volunteer their time. The EarthLove team has begun by focusing on how we can make our Emmanuel property more sustainable and supportive of the native plants and insects that are challenged by climate and human activities and to help educate our parish and our neighbors on how they can take steps to sustain native plants and animals. Our current projects include the on-going maintenance of the apple orchard, removing invasive plants from our grounds, and the creation of a native garden at the corner of Jones Hall.

One very exciting project that began in 2023 was the alliance of Emmanuel with Webster University's professor of Biology, Nicole Miller Struttmann. Dr. Miller-Struttmann is an expert in bees/pollinators

and how they are responding to long-term climate change and has been studying the local bee population that visits our orchard. She also spoke at the 9 am formation on October 29th to share her research of what she has learned about our Emmanuel native bees and her other research projects. We are hoping



that schedules will align and we can host her at another one of our 9 am formations in 2024.

In November, Earth Love combined forces with the Emmanuel Facilities team to host a fall clean up. Emmanulites young and old gathered together to remove the invasive honeysuckle and winter creeper on the Emmanuel grounds near the orchard and parking lot. The group also removed a few years of built up of limbs and yard waste and accumulated fall leaves so they could be recycled into mulch. Also started at that event was the preparation of the new Jones Hall native garden. This garden has been designed by our own Phil Egart in collaboration with Missouri Botanical Garden's Tyler Prestien as part of Phil's master gardener training. We will be in-



viting all interested Emmanuelites to join us in creating this garden in Spring. We will be planting, painting rocks to create a "river," and building bee hotels to encourage our pollinators to visit the new plants.

We invite anyone who is interested to contact us or join in on one of the upcoming events. Everyone is welcome.

#### **Emmanuel's Music Program Expands with Voices and Instruments**

The music ministry is comprised of the Emmanuel (adult) choir, the children's choir, and the many gifts and talents from the wider congregation. The adult choir, which has expanded to about 20 lay and professional vocalists, rehearses Wednesday evenings at 7:30 pm and sings every Sunday during the choir season, which runs from Labor Day to Memorial Day. The children's choir joyfully sings in worship once a month and takes its cue and exuberance from Lauren Romano, Emmanuel's Children's Choir Director entering her 10th year.

2023 marked a particularly strong year for the music program. The Emmanuel Choir rose to the challenge and succeeded in rendering several difficult anthems, notably by C. V. Stanford, Britten, and Holst. These milestones have strengthened the vocal quality, unity, and receptivity of the choir. The children's choir and their rambunctious energy continue to bring smiles and laughter to worship. The Clarion Brass quintet made its Emmanuel debut at the Bishop's Visitation over the summer and has made Emmanuel its home venue for Christmas Eve. The quintet's professionalism and exceptional caliber have profoundly enriched our worship.

Also over the summer, we said our goodbyes to Anthony Murgo for his brief time as the

tenor section leader, who relocated to Kirksville with his wife Natalie. We wish them well in their respective careers. His vacancy was filled by Patrick Zelaya, who comes from Christ Church Cathedral and possesses deep knowledge and experience in choral singing. Patrick has also begun taking organ lessons at Emmanuel. He has already played in worship a few times with great success, and we look forward to continuing his interest and growth in organ playing.

Music in worship in 2023 would not have been possible without the time, talent, and commitment from each and every member of the Emmanuel Choir whom I have the utmost honor, privilege, and joy of directing. 
and Jae for their help and support of the Children's Choir. The constant encouragement from everyone at Emmanuel is tremendously appreciated.

## **Emmanuel Preschool Celebrates 75 Years of Caring for Children**

Since 1949, Emmanuel Preschool has been proudly providing three-, four- and five-year-old children in our community with a caring and creative early childhood education. We operate a half-day program (9-11:45 a.m.) with opportunities for children to stay for extended days until 2:30 p.m.

Our preschool will be celebrating its 75th year in 2024! This is a testament to the wonderful educators that have shared their time and talent to make Emmanuel Preschool a recognized name for excellent early-childhood care and education in the Webster Groves community. Emmanuel Center for the Young Years began as a business venture by Charlotte

Goode in 1949. In 1972, we organized as a non-profit organization under the directorship of Liz Burst who dedicated herself to educating children for many joyful years. In 1983, Rita Rundquist became director, after helping in the office since 1974, and continued the good reputation of the preschool for 36 years! JoAn MacBryde taught and helped in the office from 1982-2008 and was co-director from 2008-2010. In 2010, Mrs. Rundquist and Mrs. MacBryde retired, and Angie MacBryde became director. After 5 years, our second Mrs. MacBryde took another position and passed the position on to Rachael Ludwig.

Preschool families come from across the area including Web-

ster Groves, Kirkwood, Shrewsbury, Maplewood and St. Louis. Emmanuel Preschool is a community preschool; of the 55 families we serve, only 5 are members of Emmanuel Parish.

Emmanuel Preschool's teachers, Preschool Board and I continue to be grateful to the community and our parish for allowing us to offer an outstanding preschool experience for children. I would like to offer special thanks this year to the dedication of my Preschool Board.

## Altar Guild: Silver, Linens, Flowers, and Tons of Dedication

Do you notice the color of the banners on each side of the reredos (the ornamental wall covering behind the altar) when you enter the church on Sunday mornings? They change depending on which of the six liturgical seasons we're observing: Advent, Christmas, ordinary time after Epiphany, Lent, Easter and ordinary time after Easter.

We set the Table (Altar) so that the bread and wine are set out to be blessed by the priests so we may all share in the sacramental body and blood of Christ together in the Eucharist on Sunday morning. The Altar Guild refreshes the altar between services on Sunday mornings. We prepare the kits for the Eucharistic visitors to take to those parishioners who cannot join us in person, as well as preparing the kit for the priest or deacon to take weekday communion to parishioners at Bethesda. We mark readings,

set out the silver chalices and patens and work closely with the clergy so that the services run smoothly. The Altar Guild at Emmanuel tends to these changes every Saturday morning.

We beautify with seasonal lilies and poinsettias and weekly donated altar flowers. There is the opportunity for parishioners to donate money for the flowers that are on the altar 'in

memory of' or 'in Thanksgiving for'. This can be done on line or by check with Altar Flowers in the memo line.

#### The Food Center Met Increased Need of 16% and 99 Households in 2023

The Food Center served 708 households in 2023 which included 718 children and 1250 adults. This is an increase of 16% and 99 households compared with last year. The trend continues of being very busy!! It seems that the area's social workers have found us and are referring their clients to us and sometimes coming with them to pick up the food. As in previous years, most of the clients were referred by Webster-Rock Hill Ministries (WRHM) and many are coming from outside the 63119 zip code. We are seeing many more Webster University students, mostly international students. The Food Center continued to extend its outreach committing \$2,400 in support to WRHM for the purchase of fresh vegetables, dairy and meat.

We are extremely grateful to our volunteers who continue to serve not only the Food Center but recently trained to use the new security system to screen visitors to the building. Gail Range continues her service as

We continued to get great support from our friends and neighbors who held food drives: The College School, PolyCon, and our own parishioner, John Long, who held multiple food drives amongst his family and friends!! Other food donations came from our personal angel, Dorothea Bean, as well as neighbors of our church like Holy Redeemer's St Vincent Society. Pam and Dale Penrose have scoured all the local Aldi's every month to find the food we need. Many of our parishioners have stepped up to help with the monthly

shopping as well as trying to obtain some of the food that isn't available at the time of the shopping trips. The little red wagon that is used to bring the food donations to the altar during service has provided 1366 pieces of food this year. Our parishioners were so generous in their continued donations of over 2600 food items as well as \$15,000.00 in monetary donations.

We will have a monetary shortfall in 2024. We have spent down our previous surplus and will need to find ways to either increase food items donated or monetary support. We spent over \$21,000.00 on food items in 2023. We recently received coverage by the Webster Kirkwood Times in a lengthy article about our mission and

how the community can support our efforts. Our hope is that we not only generated some local awareness but also opened doors for other resources to step forward and support our fundraising and food donation activities.

Without your support throughout the year and the much needed donations the Food Center receives from the parish and the community we could not provide the requisite nourishment to improve the quality of life for many throughout the community. Through God's grace, the Food Center was the recipient of 11,000 food items donated in 2023 in addition to a number of monetary gifts provided in honor or in memory of loved ones.
